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

hat I enjoy most about my job is listening to the stories from Park visitors about their most memorable times spent at Mt. Helix Park. Words I read or hear always evoke strong emotions of joy. I would like to say a special thank you to local resident Douglas Sherburne who graciously agreed to write an essay about his personal favorite memory. I am delighted to share it with all of you...



I worked my way up the rugged concrete steps. I carried a small flashlight in order not to stumble as I followed a route along the south boundary of the amphitheater. At the top, I was greeted by my buddy Dave who shouted, "Okay Sherburne, we're done, back to the cave." It was 2 a.m., and we had finished a two hour shift patrolling the Park and standing watch at the cross. It was Easter Morning, 1955.

When the San Diego County Council for the Boy Scouts of America was contacted requesting volunteers to patrol Mt. Helix Park the eve of Easter Sunday, they responded with, "Troop 46 out in El Cajon. Talk to them." There were eight of us, two adult leaders and six scouts, who all said, "We'll do it."

We were told to check in at four o'clock Saturday afternoon and bring warm clothing, a sleeping bag with a thick pad, a flashlight and snacks (believe me, no one brought a pad that was too thick). The chain and lock was removed from the iron gate and we set up our headquarters in the cave.

The stage, located at the foot of the Amphitheater, was cleverly constructed of reinforced concrete on top of, and spanning the space between a number of large granite boulders. A concrete floor was poured below and a partial wall with doorways constructed; the result was two large rooms with natural rock walls ... "the Cave."

As the early dawn light began to play out from behind the mountains to the east, I joined my sister and parents seated in the amphitheater. Then bright rays began to appear direct from the sun rising above those same mountains...it was a glorious morning. It was a morning for devotion, and a day to be remembered.

Mt. Helix's "New Deal"

s Easter Sunrise worshippers prepared to attend the 10th anniversary of the Mt. Helix Nature Theater's $oldsymbol{\mathsf{Q}}$ hosting of the annual community event in spring 1935, they and event promoters had additional reasons to celebrate—reasons we may take for granted today. Over the summers of 1933 and 1934 workers funded by President Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal work programs had made significant improvements to the theatre and park. Part of the Roosevelt Administration's efforts to put the unemployed to work in combating the Great Depression, the federally-funded work resulted in the widening of the narrow, uneven and precipitous original road, along with the addition of new retaining walls, over 11,000 linear feet of cobble-stone gutters, 7,000 linear feet of rock guardrail walls and the construction of the grade separation overpass that eliminated the original, dangerous intersection for the one-way loop road.

Over the years, in a typical mistake that many make when thinking about Depression-era work programs, many have assumed that the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) had completed this work. CCC camps and crews mainly worked on projects in National and State Parks and National Forests, but most public works improvements done for local jurisdictions was completed by other "alphabet-soup named" New Deal agencies. The work done at Mt. Helix is part of the latter. The Civil Works Administration (CWA) was the agency that hired local unemployed men to undertake the road improvements at Mt. Helix in the summer of 1933—the first year of the program. The following year, the CWA was reorganized into the State Emergency Relief Administration (SERA). In 1934 locally hired SERA workers completed the overpass and masonry work that we all appreciate and enjoy the benefits of today.

f you have attended a Mt. Helix Park event in the last few years, you've probably noticed a lovely couple smiling at you from behind banquet tables covered with a display of t-shirts, mugs and blankets. Claudia and Neal Hicks, owners of Think Your T-Shirt, take every opportunity to load up their van with tables, tubs, and carpets, and drive up to the Park to fundraise for their favorite non-profit.

It wasn't that long ago, though, that Claudia left the house every morning to her job as an insurance manager, and Neal. a U.S. Navy yet-

shipped or picked up at the Park office. The couple's drive for quality and outstanding customer service has brought them a lot of repeat business.


When Claudia was asked about her and her husband's future business goals, she replied, "We love what we

Adopt-A-Plot Program Steps Up Restoration Efforts

nswering a horticultural "call to arms," 15 volunteers attended recent training sessions for the Mt. Helix Park's Adopt-A-Plot program. Park-certified and working on their own schedules, they have managed to turn the tide on the invasive weed problems that threaten to overrun the Park's natural habitat. The first wave of participants has adopted almost a quarter of the restoration area. Many parcels, however, remain open for adoption.

Launched in November of 2015, the program was established in response to the Mt. Helix Garden Party's efforts to step up habitat restoration. As it turned out, the overwhelming number of invasive weeds, such as mustard, horehound, feather grass and London rocket, to name a few, were making this impossible. Many of these weeds, experts warn, attack native plants by emitting chemicals that kill them at the root level.

Adopt-A-Plot volunteer, Whitney Dueñez, has experience both eradicating invasive weeds and working with native plant species. Dueñez, who also volunteers at the Water Conservation Garden, has taken on two large plots within the Park, one on a northerly slope and one on a southerly slope, each with different plant potential.

Dueñez says she noticed the weed problem on a visit last summer, even before reading about the Adopt-A-Plot program, "It made my heart hurt," recalled Dueñez, who lived in the back country for almost thirty years and has extensive experience trying to eradicate black mustard and other invasive weeds. "It took a number of years to get it under control," she noted. "When I saw the article about the weed abatement program in the Park's magazine, I thought it was a fabulous idea and wanted to participate."

Dueñez and the other Adopt-A-Plot volunteers have already made a visible difference in the Park, some eradicating up to 90% of the weed plants on their plots. The process, however, is far from complete since local

plant experts say the weeds must be removed continually until the cycle is broken which can take a minimum of three years.

Their efforts will be showcased in the upcoming California Native Plant Society's April 2, Garden Native Tour which, along with Mt. Helix Park includes 20 other gardens in East County.
