### LED Candlelight Concerts Brighten Up Park Events Lineup

he Candlelight Open Air Concert Series hosted by Fever San Diego has hit the Mt. Helix Park events lineup in 2022 and fans are giving it five-star reviews. From May to October the company produced six concerts, attracting more than 3000 attendees and are planning to return in 2023.

Arrangements performed by the string quartet, Range Ensemble of San Diego, included Vivaldi's "Four Seasons," "Cold Play" and, in October, featured Halloween favorites like Michael Jackson's "Thriller" and "This Is Halloween," by Danny Elfman. They also included the classical pieces "Danse Macabre" by Camille Sant-Saens and "Erlkonig" by Franz Shubert.

This concert series signature ambiance is achieved using hundreds of LED Candles scattered throughout the stage and amphitheater. They radiantly illuminate the musicians, located in the forefront of the stage, in a warm glow as the sun sets and the city lights become visible in the background.

Goli Henderson of Pt. Loma and Marty Anderson of La Jolla attended the August "Coldplay" concert and described it as "magical," adding that it was one of the most memorable concerts they had ever experienced.

### Park Allstar Sean Carroll Returns to Mt Helix Park

Sean Carroll is a VIP at Mt. Helix Park. As a 6th grader, Sean's article—penned for the International History Fair in 1989—outlined ongoing legal battles to remove the cross, sparking action within the community and a "Save the Cross" movement.

Now an officer in the Marine Corp., Carroll is currently living in Portugal but is considering relocating to San Diego in the near future. Staffers Krista Powers and Peggy Junker were at the office to receive him, his brother Kevin Carroll and their mother Margie Carroll during a surprise visit in September.

### **Park Restoration Updates**

**CROSS:** Mt. Helix Park, its amphitheater and 35-foot memorial Cross, turn 100 in 2025. Constructed and dedicated on Easter Sunday, the Cross has become a symbol for the 12-acre nature Park and a beacon for the community.

According to board director Bob Ball, the Cross restoration is complete and the structure is projected to last another 100 years. Upgrades to the irrigation system and landscaping will soon follow.

In addition, the metal post fence surrounding the Cross enclosing the five original light boxes has been repaired and painted. All the rebuilt and refinished boxes now contain new LED lights which illuminate the Cross nightly. Thanks to the rewiring of the middle light box on the west side of the Cross, non-operational since before the Foundation took over stewardship of the Park, the Cross has additional lighting. Work is now in progress to manufacture and install new metal grates to protect the LED lights. This project is expected to be completed before Thanksgiving.

Coinciding with the new lights are electrical upgrades that will serve not only the Cross but the amphitheater as well.

Generating a flurry of positive feedback from Park-goers, staff are receiving regular messages of "thanks" for the work that has been completed. Stories have surfaced about neighbors going outside each night to look at the Cross, while others report starting each day with a visit for quiet reflection. At least one frequent visitor commented that it looks larger, probably because the addition of three feet to the Cross's base during the restoration is now visible.





**STORAGE:** Organizing maven, Kimberly Bardin with the help of her husband, Bob Bardin, and a handful of volunteers, have completed an extensive organizing project of the Park's storage areas. This involved the addition of storage shelves, bins and labels, simplifying access to and storage of supplies. Thanks to her efforts, Park staff and volunteers can easily locate everything from maintenance supplies to event tables, chairs and props.

HANDRAILS: Two convenience handrails have been added on either side of the stairs leading from the parking lot to the amphitheater, one of the most frequently accessed areas.

Mt. Helix Park hosted its 5th annual nature event in June. After a two-year hiatus, Family Nature Day returned with booths featuring composting with worms, live bee displays, butterfly and bird conservation, arts and craft activities, presentations by local ecological and nature groups, and great food provided by Sapos Tacos.

Promoting the art of Tech-Breaks, Unplug Collaborative was on hand with a list of activities designed to encourage putting electronic devices down and connecting with people via conversations and experiences. Unplug Collaborative board member Claudia Erickson, talked to visitors about the importance of going outside and connecting with the natural world, and then hosted a search for the group's unofficial mascot, Rodney Rooster.


Also featured were Master Gardener Association of San Diego County, San Diego Pollinator Alliance, Resource Conservation District, Solana Center, Earth Discovery Institute, San Diego Audubon, Art Smarts, Casa de Oro Library, Dictionary Hill Open Space, Senior Gleaners, US Fish & Wildlife, Helix de Oro Fire Counsel, KidWings Nature School, and Mt. Helix Bees.

Taking the lead on this year's free, family-friendly festival was chair Deborah Austin. Austin, along with Habitat Restoration Committee members, organized the 25 stations dedicated to educating the public about nature, conservation and having fun. She said the response from both the public and vendors was enthusiastic with 100% of the vendors saying they would be participating in future events.

ostering positive vibes and a fit community, Rose Polak Walters has been bringing her brand of vinyasa flow yoga to Mt. Helix Park since March 2009 when she began her weekly outdoor classes. Walter's classes have consistently taken place on Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 9 a.m. to 10:15 a.m. In 2019 her long-time friend and fellow yoga instructor, Jessi Bruce, joined her offering Tuesday and Thursday classes.

Despite the Park closure, social distancing, and while raising their kids, the two certified instructors kept classes ongoing in 2020 by making them available virtually. Currently, the duo continues teaching both in-person and virtually. Classes are open to the public, designed for all levels, and offered on a donation basis with a portion of the proceeds donated back to the Park.

Walters, who also served as a member of the Mt. Helix Park Foundation board of directors, says she enjoys being part of the Park's community. "I love Mt. Helix Park. The winding drive up and down the hill is unlike anything else in San Diego, and the Park itself offers such a quiet, peaceful space" describes Walters. "I am humbled to teach yoga here with such wonderful people, with endless support from Peggy, Krista, and the Board, and I hope to offer classes for years to come. But seriously, why would I ever leave?!"

### **Guests Abuzz with Success of Food & W**

Signal and expectations, this year's gala, newly branded the Mt. Helix Food & Wine Festival, set several records for the Park, among them ticket sales and revenue. With more than 600 attendees and 25 participating food and beverage vendors, the 15th annual fundraiser evoked overwhelmingly positive feedback from the community. Many guests said it felt more like a festival and less like a fundraiser, applauding the array of guests, many of whom were from other communities and had never before attended the annual event.

The beach-themed evening featured a tree-lined entrance complete with a lifeguard station, classic surf tunes by Surf's Up, and a signature tropical drink. Newly added box seating was a hit with complimentary beach swag and beverage service. The new seating offered attendees reserved seating in the amphitheater, a less formal alternative to VIP table seats.

While this annual benefit achieved its fundraising objectives, the thumbs-up it received from attendees was a sign to festival Chairperson, Susan Schalin, that the planning for this event is moving in the right direction.

"The success of this year's event was due to many factors that came together," she began. "The community who joined us as guests, the guests who bid on our auction items, and the wine, beer, spirits and food vendors who donated their time, food and drinks. In addition, the army of volunteers who helped prepare in the months and weeks leading up to the event, and during the event, were critical to our success." Schalin went on to point out that the Mt. Helix Food & Wine Festival not only raises important funds to keep the Park open, but creates a context for neighbors to connect and reconnect, and meet friends new and old.

Schalin said she looks forward to next year's event, which she says will be "even bigger and better," with the capacity to accommodate even more guests for this

Schalin will be joined by Kimberly Bardin, who will co-chair the 2023 event slated for Saturday, August 19. Bardin served as the Auction Committee chair this year and has already found two replacements who will co-chair the auction as she steps into her new role.

Contributing to the success of this year's attendance were several media spots featuring Park Executive Director, Krista Powers. A three-year veteran of the gala, Powers kept the event going during the 2020 closures by taking the entire event virtual. Under her guidance, it returned this year to a large-scale production as attendance exceeded prepandemic levels. A branding and marketing specialist, she doubled down on this year's media outreach efforts resulting in spots on both KUSI and Fox 5 news, as well as writeups in several local print news media, including East County Magazine and the La Mesa Courier.

### SDAA Experts Narrate the Sky for Park Members







t the highest point in the Park, on a clear night in November, a crowd of Park members gathered around five telescopes brought in by the San Diego Astronomy Association (SDAA) for an exclusive after-dark guided tour of the cosmos.

With the lights at the Cross temporarily off, the nearly full moon was prominent in the sky. According to SDAA Director Dave Decker, the moon, Jupiter and Saturn were the "big winners" with spectacular views of each.

Computer screen feeds helped bring images from the high powered telescopes to star-gazers and sparked questions and conversation about astronomy. "It was a great event," remarked Decker, adding that the estimated crowd of between 150 and 200 people was the perfect size given the amount of equipment and number of SDAA volunteers onhand.

Star-gazing equipment consisted of a 10-inch Dobsonian, a 14 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>-inch wood Dobsonian, a Refractor and an eVscope which represents some of the group's latest technology. Decker said the aperture (the larger the aperture, the more light and more information that can be captured) for the evening's images ranged from 70mm to 368mm and provided a good variety of images.

### HABITAT HABITAT HABITA Conservation Student Joins Habitat Team

For almost 10 years, Park conservation efforts have yielded programs that encourage locals to learn by doing, sideby-side with experts and other enthusiasts. Eager for practical knowledge, volunteers sign up to work on Park projects guided by California Native gardeners who inspire and teach a new crop of planting and irrigation specialists.

Joining the team as one of the group leaders in 2021, local landscape designer and EPA certified Watershed Wise Landscape professional, Deborah Austin, has recently taken on a mentorship role and is working with local college student, Courtney Rodseth, who is volunteering at the Park as part of a work-experience class.

A native of Spring Valley, Rodseth has been coming to Mt. Helix Park since she was a kid. Her passion for native plants led a friend to introduce her to Austin, who for the past year has been cultivating a butterfly garden at the base of the cross through a grant from the Xerces Society.

Beginning her tutelage in September of 2022, Rodseth says there is a lot of

potential for her to learn, and contribute. The instruction occurs while Rodseth and Austin water, plant and prepare to calculate just how much each plant requires for optimum health.

"I'm so excited to be a part of a project that shows people the beauty and amazing qualities of native plants while contributing some good to the world," said an enthusiastic Rodseth. "Water conservation has become such an important thing here in San Diego," she points out. Outlining their task, Rodseth says she hopes their project has long-term benefits for the Park. "We are going to focus on irrigation and plan to calculate how to water the native plants on Mt. Helix efficiently so that they get just the right amount of water. Saving water is one of the many benefits of planting natives, along with reducing landscape maintenance, providing habitat to native animals and pollinators, and reducing the use of pesticides."

### **DID YOU KNOW?**

Mt. Helix Park is mapped out into 45 different Habitat areas and volunteer individuals, families, and organizations help care for the different areas of the Park.

It takes a village to keep the Habitat restored for our Pollinators and Wildlife. Insects are specialists and many will become extinct if they do not have specific native plants. Sadly, we have already lost species and are in the midst of a pollinator extinction crisis due to the removal of native plants, pesticides, and herbicides.

We can all help and share with future generations the lessons we have learned today. Plus, kids honestly have a blast getting into the dirt, and learning about the various critters that live everywhere from the soil to the sky. It's impossible to not see many species around the Park and we are full of life because of the volunteer efforts to restore the habitat.


Additionally, if each one of us, just added a small section of native plants, we could begin to restore the pollinator pathways for migration and movement from hilltop to hilltop. Plus you get to watch your yard come alive.

#### HOW TO MAKE IT EASY?

Join us on most 1st Saturdays of the month to volunteer in the Habitat and learn from some of San Diego's top experts. It's always a good time for all ages. Plus, we know the health benefits the soil, sun, and fresh air provide to our bodies.

We also have a few more habitats up for adoption. What does this mean? Mt. Helix Park provides plants and education. You just come as your schedule fits and help out. Many of the habitats are already established and just need some love every so often, checking for litter, weeding here and there, maybe a trim or some new plants, and letting the Park know of any concerns.
